Dear Parents/Carers,

Six years ago, with an OFSTED inspection due in a couple of weeks, a vacancy arose for Chair of Governors. In the absence of other volunteers I agreed to take on the job on a 'temporary' basis. Before I give it up in September here are a few reflections on the changes in those years.

In 2003 Fairlands had been through a difficult period. An earlier OFSTED report had judged it as a school with 'serious weaknesses.' Under the leadership of former Head, John Hayes, sufficient improvement had been made for a judgement of 'Satisfactory.'

Five years, and five head teachers later OFSTED again found Fairlands to be 'Satisfactory.' Given all the changes in senior and other staff as well as other upheavals (including a major fire just before the inspection) this was an achievement, which can be built on. There are still 'areas for improvement' (new jargon for weakness) in some aspects of pupil learning and behaviour, but the trends are all in the right direction.

We now have a school that is attracting increasing numbers, tribute to its growing reputation in the local community. We have a flourishing Pre-School, which is meeting previously unmet local needs. The physical appearance of the school and its grounds are an outward sign of this new confidence and success.

The most important thing Governors do is to appoint the Headteacher. I know that the best decision we have made was to appoint Mr. Staples who has presided with calm authority over the school's transformation, a process far from complete.

I would like to thank all those who have contributed to the development of Fairlands School, and helped to make chairing the governors such an enjoyable, as well as challenging, experience. These include my fellow Governors, teaching and support staff, all those who help the school in a voluntary capacity and the parents and pupils who make up the Fairlands Community.
